PREACHING THE WORD - We believe that Spirit-filled, bible-based, text-driven, clear, joyful, engaging, and life-changing preaching and hearing the Word is the central ministry in Jesus' church, as he told us in his great commission. We continue to blend the arts into our preaching through things like visuals, story, sand art, and pumpkin carving sermons. In 2024 we preached through several sermon series: *Created to Dream, Ecclesiastes: I Tried Everything, Holy Week Events, Romans 9-16, Amazing Women in the NT, This Is the Way, Galatians 1-6, Generous Living, Mary's Song: My Soul Magnifies the Lord. Those who preached Sunday sermons this year: Shanna Crowell, Carmen Frederico, Jeff Vorce, Alpha Kanu, Mike Smith, Bill Swilling, Ron Bouthillette, J. Frederico, and Bunty Bunce.*

BAPTISMS & MEMBERSHIP – The Lord brought 3 new baptisms into His church in 2024! Lucas Torey, Samara Tardiff, and Jamie Levesque. We assigned each baptism candidate a mentor who walked them through a New Life Bible study. Praise the Lord for New Life! Centerpoint also had 6 new members join the church. These new members are already contributing in big ways to the central ministries of the church, praise the Lord for the people He brings!

SMALL GROUPS — Groups and Studies this year included: Grief Share, Centerpoint Seniors Luncheon, Intentional Grandparenting, Jr & Sr High Youth Groups, Awana, Spencer's Life Group, Wednesday Online Prayer, One Church One Day Prayer Vigil, Young Adults, Tuesday Women's Prayer Meeting, Sisterhood Gatherings and bible studies, Crazy Crafters, Food For Thought, Men's Life Group, and other small group Bible studies. This year we started a Young Adult Group that meets mid-week. Food for Thought has begun working with local food ministries to feed the homeless at Exit 1. Our Youth Group and Missions Team are planning a Belize Mission Trip in 2026. Our volunteer leaders work hard to consistently develop and lead their small groups and studies. Our Youth Group, Awana, and Seniors Ministry keep growing, all praise to the Lord and His faithful people.

BUILDING UPDATES CONTINUE – Thanks to the hard work and commitment of our skilled volunteers, we continued to update many areas of the church interior and grounds. Major projects in 2024 were renovating the CE restrooms and replacing our main boilers.

WORSHIP MUSIC – This year we hired Matt Jones as our worship leader. Matt and his whole family are a real joy and blessing to Centerpoint and our worship music ministry. We did a church wide Christmas production called *Imagine Christmas* – with adult choir, children's choir, dance, drama, soloists, full band with horn section, narration, and a gospel message. Our adult choir really re-ignited this year for the Christmas production. We look forward to growing our creative arts in worship in 2025 to the Glory of God!

INTER-GENERATIONAL MINISTRY — We see and affirm the beauty of intergenerational family atmosphere at Centerpoint. The generations are a gift to our church body, and we continually look for ways in which we can connect across the generations. On any Sunday morning, our ministry teams range in age from Jr. High to our senior saints. Every generation at Centerpoint has expressed the desire to reach the next generation of believers. We continually work for unity as we love one another for glory of God and the building of his church.

CHURCH BUDGET — We experienced a budget surplus of \$15k in 2024 even though midyear our budget was looking bleak. America has suffered from two years of record high inflation and people's incomes are being stretched to the limit. We are so thankful for our faithful congregation who respond with generous giving, and Centerpoint continues to grow with many new families serving in meaningful ways every week. Our ministries kept their budget spending tight this year, and amid all of this we were able to replace our boilers for \$35K from savings. God is good! In 2025 we will continue to operate with frugality, generosity, wisdom, and trust in the Lord for His provision as we move into this next season of ministry.

We are so thankful and full of praise as we have felt the Lord's hand bless us and keep us, and we've seen His face shine upon Centerpoint in 2024. I look forward to serving and loving people one step closer to Jesus with you all in 2025!

BOARD OF DEACONS ANNUAL REPORT 2024 "CONGREGATIONAL SERVICE"

The Deacon board continues to help make Centerpoint Church a place you want to be. As we are a praying church! We on the Deacon board meet every month when possible, we pray for guidance and serve in many areas within the church. We have a direct activity in security of the church. The Deacons are involved in most activities in the sanctuary. Our ongoing ministry includes the following commitments:

HELPING HANDS" We have the Helping hands program, assisting those in need by offering various services by completing many jobs, usually at the homes of members and others, disabled or unable to complete work like plumbing, yard work, snow shoveling, house and car maintenance, and financial advice or other tasks needed. This is on a volunteer basis from church members Church members help members, and non members, without budget cost in most all cases. Administered by Deacon Bill Ellis

CARE SHEPERDS: Care Shepherds now have a care group that meets once a month to discuss the needs of church members who are sick, need transportation, a phone call, a card, of other things. We visit the sick and work with the Deaconesses in their support for the Food for Thought, special prayer programs, Communion, projects helping families in need, including funerals as needed at church. We also, administer the Care Shepherd program, with Chris Waterhouse, special organizational board, which has a goal of each member helping members to keep in touch with members that may be in need due to sickness or other concerns so, the Pastors can be aware of situations and administer properly to help that member. We care for everyone (In confidence) and want to help all persons associated with Centerpoint Church.

NEW MEMBERSHIP AND BAPTISMS: We assist the Pastor in the "new life program" to baptism, and or direct membership counseling. MENTOR partners are held to allow the prospective church member to better understand their new life in Christ, and how Centerpoint Church will fit into that growth for them in Christ."

VETERANS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM: We continue to assist our veterans needs both in and out of the church by assisting veterans on how to apply for V.A. benefits, obtaining forms and how to fill them out, where to go to obtain assistance with food and household needs, going with them to the VA. and just listening to their concerns. All Deacons involved.

CHURCH SECURITY: We are also assisting in the development of better security now in place under the direction of Deacon Sal Cianci with more to come! We worked to get better lighting at the entrance of the driveway.

DEACONS FUND: We have connected with the Salem Town Hall Resource Officer and other churches in the area this year to better assist those in need who require help from more than once source immediately. We have helped 10 families this past year who were in need of immediate assistance. We direct the Deacon fund to help our member and non member families and community, in confidence, through your generous giving to the Deacons fund. This year our Deacon fund has helped a great number of people and continues to be a healthy source of help to those in need. The Deacons maintain a town, community, and public help assistance information source for all. We look forward as a Deacon Board in 2024, to achieve many positive goals for the church.

Leading Children One Step Closer to Jesus

At Centerpoint, we believe each generation has unique gifts to share in our church community. Adults, children, and teens are vital members and partners in Christ, engaging in our mission to love God and people closer to Jesus.

This summer, we intentionally fostered intergenerational relationships by working together (e.g., UPKIDS and Sunday Morning Teams), participating in shared experiences (e.g., worship services, youth group missions, and a camping trip), and praying for one another.

It was wonderful to have our kids with us during the service this summer while our Kids' Church classes paused, giving our volunteers a chance to rest and refresh. Each Sunday, the Kid Cart in the entryway provided kid clipboards containing activities to engage kids and sustain their attention throughout the worship service. Moreover, we offered seating in the Nursery (0-2 years), Family Room, and overflow tables in the social hall.

Kid's Church started up again on September 8th. After a year of developing our curriculum inspired by the Jesus Storybook Bible, the CE Board evaluated multiple new options and selected the Trueway Kids Curriculum for 2024-2025. We offer three Kids Church classes: pre-K to Kindergarten, grades 1-2, and grades 3-5. Carrie Waterhouse oversees our Nursery program for our littlest ones. She has a team that serves on a rotating basis in the nursery

Melissa Marenco and Melanie Tremblay continued to serve as Kids Church Co-Directors (Sunday School Superintendent). Part of their responsibilities includes recruiting volunteers and teachers, helping with schedules and lessons, and providing information to teachers and parents about curriculum and policies. We have a fantastic team of dedicated teachers and student leaders committed to our KIDS Church program. On August 21st, Melanie and Melissa conducted a teacher training session also attended by our Awana Leadership Team. We purchased more team Kids Church shirts to wear when teaching and serving in our Kids Church programs, bringing a sense of teamwork and unity to our kids' ministries.

Our Awana program (K-12) resumed this fall with new families. Ashley Smith, our Awana Director, introduced ideas for our growing club. We switched the meeting time to Sunday nights. We added a Cubbies program for ages 3-4, expanding our Awana club, which already includes Sparkies and the T&T program. These changes required more volunteers to run efficiently. God provided for our program with faithful volunteers. Ashley continues to seek additional activities for our club to participate in, like the Grand Prix and Awana Games.

Our Youth Group continues to grow and expand. During the first half of this year, we gathered on Wednesdays, then switched to Friday nights for the remainder. This shift to Friday evenings has allowed more volunteers to help with the growing group. Mike Smith serves as our paid youth leader, and alongside his team, he provides an outstanding program for students in grades 6 through 12. This year, the youth group attended the Deep Freeze Winter Camp, participated in Work Camp New England in July, and co-hosted a retreat at Camp Berea with other local churches in the fall.

At the end of 2024, the CE Board purchased a CVLI license. This license enables us to host movie nights and outreach events at the church, allowing us to show copyrighted clips and movies for our ministry activities.

The CE Board is working on updating its Children's Ministry Handbook for 2025.

Month-by-Month Christian Education Events

In March, we held an Easter Egg Hunt.

On August 10th, Melissa Marenco and Amanda Riccardi led UP KIDS- a Saturday Camp- pointing kids upward in God's Word.

We held a back-to-school service and fall kick-off on September 8th. During the service, we gave 3rd-grade students a Bible. After the service, we held a Ministry Fair showcasing many ministries, Bible studies, boards, and committees and had icees, popcorn, donuts and a bouncy house. This was an opportunity for our church members and visitors to learn more about our ministries and connect.

We also participated in several other events that served the Salem community, including blood drives, Salem Family Fun Day, and the Salem Scramble.

Ongoing Ministries and Small Groups

Centerpoint Senior Group was active this year. It is led by Lorraine Lindenberg and a team of dedicated people who cook, care for, and create programs (e.g., music, crafts, and games) for the group. The Senior group meets on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays at Centerpoint for a meal, fellowship, and music testimonies.

The MomCo (formerly known as Centerpoint MOPS), led by Kim King, took a break from meeting in 2024 and will resume in 2025.

Men's Ministries/Men Bible Studies Under the leadership of Jeff Vorce, a men's group met and studied "Men of the Bible" by DL Moody and "Becoming a King" in 2024. They will study "Disciplines of a Godly Man" starting in January 2025.

Centerpoint Sisterhood/Women Bible Study The Sisterhood Team finished their study on the Gospel of John. They have scheduled six gatherings for the 2024-2025 year, providing opportunities to connect and build relationships in an intergenerational setting. On October 26th, the Sisterhood/Women's Ministry team hosted a Beth Moore Simulcast and, in December, a Christmas Tea. Joanna Vorce led a women's Bible study: Beth Moore's *James: Mercy Triumphs*. (See the deaconess's annual report for more details about the women's ministry and Bible Study.) Valerie Fowler has continued to lead a group of eleven women in studying the book of Exodus.

Bible Studies and Life Group - Led by John and Jill Spencer, this weekly Life Group and Bible Study is currently focused on the book of Romans, beginning each session with a video teaching by Gary Hambrick. The study will extend into February 2024. Approximately 18 individuals attend, with 11 to 16 actively participating each week. The group dedicates time to prayer and has experienced many answers to their prayers.

Grief Share has been actively growing in participants and offers a safe place to journey through grief. Rachel Kingston and Dolores facilitated the Tuesday evening sessions, while Pam McLoughlin and Nelda Campbell led the Monday afternoon sessions. In addition to the weekly program, Rachel, Dolores, Pam, and Nelda also led several seminars and series.

Our **dance ministry**, led by Laura Preston, supported the Christmas production and provided several dancers with the needed dance items, skirts, sashes, and ribbons.

Library- Finally, our librarian, Valerie Fowler, did much work in our two libraries and offered new material and selections to read. With the library budget of \$500 for 2024, 45 new books were purchased for both the Church Library and the Children's Library.

The CE Board joyfully praises God for His faithful provisions in every aspect of our CE ministries. As we look ahead to 2025, we're excited to build up and support teams dedicated to sharing the gospel, connecting people with our church community, nurturing disciples, and guiding our youth and families on their journey closer to Jesus, one step at a time.

The Trustee Board is grateful to the church body for the support it receives to accomplish all that is needed by our church.

We are pleased to announce that Scott Johnson was elected to the Trustee Board in 2024. We are grateful for the talents and skill set that each member of the board brings. The merger with Finance continues to work well.

As stewards for the church, we have been working to look at ways to make the money we have in savings and checking work more aggressively with higher interest-bearing accounts, such as Money Market accounts and CD's.

The parking lot was sealed and stripped in 2024. Potentially giving us several more years of use.

We continue to search for ways to save and reduce costs with the operations of the church. We replaced the old florescent light bulbs with more efficient LED bulbs. The rebate check of \$1250 was received the first week of January.

Work on the boiler replacement has commenced and should be completed within the month of January. On a yearly basis we review oil, gas, electric, copier, phone and insurance costs to search and look for the best deal to negotiate for the upcoming year.

With all volunteer help, we have been in the process of renovating the CE wing bathrooms. The Trustees are sincerely grateful to all who step up to help.

January

- We increased the Misc. line item to cover the majority of the \$ that will be given to Mission's visits and Missions Sundays speaker gifts, OCC support and one-time gifts
- We decided to decrease the number of Missionaries we support from 14 to 11 for 2023, we continue to support 11 in 2024. With the administrative responsibilities we have, it was decided that we can better support 11 Missionaries in all areas—through prayer, financially and relationally as we strive to know them more intimately.
- Began discussions for an OCC packing party and the administrative tasks involved with this to keep it up throughout the year. We set a goal of 200 shoeboxes. Dawn & Jamie playing a key role as POC for this.
- We collected 2,009 shoeboxes in 2023 at our Drop off location.
- Began discussions for a March Missions Sunday
- Began discussions to consider supporting new partners in 2024
- Amy & Kim began discussions with Steve Cullum from NNYM, Youth Ministries a referral from Pastor Zach and Mary and Keith Faust from Wycliffe, a referral from Jill & John Spencer in our congregation.
- In preparation for budget discussions, we sent our 2024 Support forms to be returned. These
 forms provide with updates, prayer requests and goals for 2024 for each our Global Outreach
 Partners in preparation for budget discussions & allocations

February

- Sent yearly support letters to all Global Outreach Partners (through email and hard copy) notifying them of their financial support; Sent 2024 update forms to collect any changes, prayer requests and updated information for their ministries.
- Proposed increase of \$500 for all current GOPS—team agreed with further discussion points.
 - Increased all by \$500, except Street Life
 - Subedi's and Frederico's are our families
 - Street Life will continue to receive \$3200 with no increase monetarily for 2024; We will allocate \$300 in Misc to Street Life for purchases of supplies. As a one-time gift & while their ministry is in transition
 - New organizations—Wycliffe & NNYM
 - We will increase OCC budget line from \$650 to \$800. We had over 10 requests for shoeboxes from local churches, fliers & information from small groups and other churches in 2023; Raising this will allow us to help small groups and churches bring OCC to their groups without the cost of getting started at their church. We felt this important as the community drop off location as a resource for OCC in our community.
 - Allocate \$2500 in Misc—which is an increase from \$1573.00 in 2023
 - We will begin to support these new organizations—Wycliffe/Faust family & NNYM/ Steve Cullum. We will begin supporting them with one time installment of \$1500 each for 2024
 - We will also continue to discuss support for Light of Life ministry & Ignite the Fire Ministries, as well as one-time gifts for Lazarus House, Arabic Bible and New Life Christmas support
- · Also a consideration for Misc budget was speaker gifts

Kim & Amy reached out to Pastor Zach about a gift speaker gifts for Missions Sunday. In years past, when we had a speaker who delivers the sermon, we have given a check with split funds from both the pulpit budget and Missions budget.

- Pastor Zach responded with these points and let us know if Missions can sponsor the entire speaker gift that would be helpful.
- The pulpit budget decreased for 2024.
- Recommended at least a \$500-\$700 gift and discussed way back when we would take a love offering.
- Many give digitally.
- The team decided we will allocate \$800 out of Misc for Bunty and \$100 for Tim for Missions Sunday for Missions Sunday in March
